CWSF RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors of the Central Washington Fair Association has endeavored to make this Fair truly representative of the interests of Central Washington, and to provide wholesome and varied entertainment for the patrons. The Board will welcome suggestions for improving the Fair.

1. If the Fair shows a substantial income, the profit will be used to make a better Fair this year and for years to come. The Board expects to be able to pay all premiums in full, however, since the Fair must be self-sustaining, the Board reserves the right to make whatever reduction in premiums is necessary in order to avoid a deficit.
2. Any person knowingly violating any of the following rules of the Fair will thereby forfeit, and may be barred from receiving any premium that may be awarded him/her.
3. Due to fire regulations issued by the State Fire Marshal, no smoking will be permitted in Fair Buildings or Barns.
4. No one will be allowed to sleep in the Barns and Buildings
5. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed to be brought in by exhibitors or consumed in exhibit buildings and/or barns. The exception is The Wine Garden in the Ag Building, Beer Tents and Cantina, where alcohol will be sold.
6. Food handlers and vendors must comply with state laws and local regulations pertaining to health certificates and health ordinances. They must be dressed in a neat and clean manner. Food supplies must be pure and wholesome. Concessionaires must confine themselves to assigned space.
7. **Only animals entered for competition are permitted except assistance animals accompanying persons with disabilities.**
8. The owner of exhibit or exhibits will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by or arisen from, any animal exhibited by him/her and will release the Central Washington Fair Association from any liability from loss, damage or injury to livestock, fair patrons, or other property while such is on the grounds of the Central Washington State Fair. Should the Central Washington Fair Association file suit or action against any exhibitor on any cause, the exhibitor agrees to pay to the Fair Association such reasonable sums, as attorney fees, as the court having jurisdiction of the case may determine. Livestock exhibitors will at all times give necessary and personal attention to their stock and at the close of the Fair must take entire charge of and remove the same promptly. No officer or employee of the Fair has authority to suspend or change this rule.
9. All entries must be on official entry forms which may be obtained by contacting the Central Washington State Fair Office, 1301 S. Fair Avenue, Yakima, WA 98901, Phone: (509)-248-7160. (See also your department rules regarding entry requirements). Entry forms must be properly filled in and signed. All entry fees are nonrefundable after Sept. 1, 2009. A \$20.00 office charge per exhibitor will be charged on all entry refunds up to this date. After Sept. 1, NO REFUNDS unless extenuating circumstances exist. Written requests will be reviewed and if approved, an additional \$20.00 will be charged per exhibitor (total \$40.00). You must have a letter from the Veterinarian and a letter requesting a refund detailing all fees that are being requested. If entries are made after the closing dates there will be an additional charge per entry. NSF checks will be charged a \$50.00 fee in addition to the amount of the check. If you have any outstanding entry fees or check fees those will need to be paid before premium checks are issued.
10. The management reserves the right to accept, reject entirely, or accept conditionally any entry or applications.

EXHIBITORS

11. Most of the people who come to the Fair do so in order to see the exhibits of superior livestock and other products of the farm, the home and the factory. In order to offer an attractive and interesting fair, exhibits must be kept in place through the closing day. The exact time at which displays may be removed is listed in the rules. No article or animal may be removed before such time without special permission of the manager, and any article or animal removed without such permission will forfeit any premiums won. Exhibits must stay in department area for all 10 days of the Fair unless management displays them elsewhere.
12. Entries are open to all youth. Entries may be made by youth in grade 1 (age 6 after January 1, of present year) through grade 12 (or can be 19 years of age if birthday is after January 1, of present year.) No married exhibitors may enter the Youth Livestock Department. Age limits will vary within areas so please check the area you wish to enter.
13. Exhibitors must be at least 6 years old to enter the Open Class Livestock Department unless otherwise stated within the department. In livestock departments that have only one exhibitor, will not be shown for competition, the animals entered will be paid as a display exhibit only and not for competition.
14. Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their own booths. Concessionaires or renters of booth space are required to keep their spaces neat and clean.
15. All decorating on the Fairgrounds, in or out of buildings, must be done with flameproof type products.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS – YOUTH SHOW

16. Entries in livestock breeding classes are open to classes listed. Entries in market classes of livestock may be grade or crossbred. Exhibitors of livestock may enter two animals in one class. Exhibits entered in the wrong classes may be reclassified at the discretion of Superintendent.

AWARDS & PREMIUMS

17. Judges must not award a prize to any unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the Fair that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. The CWSF will do its best to make sure that all prizes & premiums are paid. If you think that your item should have received premiums & you have not received a check by December 1st, 2010, please call the CWSF office. After January 1st, 2011 we will no longer honor the 2010 awards.

1099 INFORMATION

If you are expecting to receive \$600.00 or more in premiums, premium checks will not be issued unless we have **a social security number or I.D. number of the owner in addition to the ranch name.**

18. Management and/or Superintendents, reserve the right to cancel the class where there is no competition, or where there are fewer entries in a class than number of premiums offered. Judges may, in their discretion, award premiums of such grade as the exhibitor deserves. No award will be made

for champions unless there is sufficient competition as determined by the judge. If an exhibit does not qualify for a listed class, that exhibit will be entered under a miscellaneous class, if a miscellaneous class exists. If not enough exhibits are entered in an American-judged department, one or all classes may be canceled.

19. If our judging staff deems that any entry is of professional quality, it will be judged in the professional category.

20. No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the judges during their adjudication, or with the Fair's staff, or to offer any criticism of an exhibit of another. Violators of this rule shall be excluded immediately from the judging area and from competition and be subject to such additional penalties, including cancellation of awards, as the management shall consider proper.

21. The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases under their jurisdiction except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award is proven. In such cases, the authority of Management shall be final.

22. Should any animal or article awarded a prize be disqualified, the one gaining the lower prize shall graduate up into the higher position next in order above them, if in the opinion of the judge they are worthy of such prize

23. No exhibitor may receive more than (1) cash award in any one class, unless otherwise stated.

24. Premiums are paid only from the records of the Judge's sheet. Ribbons, tags or cards have no value as to payment. Premium checks will be payable to the person whose name is on the entry form. Animal entries must be entered under the owner's name - see livestock rule #4.

25. Checks must be cashed within six months of issue date. This rule is strictly enforced. Please cash premium checks when you receive them. They will not be honored after six months and will not be reissued. Lost or stolen checks will not be reissued. Ribbons and Rosettes that are lost or stolen will not be replaced.

PROTESTS

26. Superintendents shall have authority over all matters within their respective areas, subject to the Management. Protest of decisions may be submitted to the Board whose decision is final. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the manager within (24) hours after the cause of protest.

PARKING

27. Cars will be towed away from designated parking if left overnight or are without a proper sticker, and impounded at owner's expense and risk.

28. Large trucks that are not being moved daily may be parked in a designated area.

29. At 9:00 AM every day, all vehicles must be moved from within the Fairgrounds gate to designated parking areas or they will be impounded at the owner's risk and expense.

30. Parking credentials will be required at Gate 11 Entrance. We are no longer using Dalton Lane as an entrance.

DEPARTURES

31. All exhibitors picking up their exhibits and/or displays will be required to have some form of ID to indicate ownership. Also check department rules pertaining to release.

RULES & REGULATIONS STATEMENT

The Fair Board has made every effort to make these rules and regulations definite and clear, but reserve the final and absolute right to interpret them as may become necessary, settle controversies arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Fair.

**GENERAL RULES FOR FABRIC & THREAD,
Crafts, Foods-Baked/Preserved,**

Please read - The General Rules and Regulations of the Fair, in addition to the following, are to be observed.

- All exhibits in this Department must be the work of the exhibitor. They must be finished, new, clean and made within the last two years (except Foods and Food Pres. areas) Any entry which has been exhibited at a previous Central Washington State Fair may not be entered again. Articles stained, soiled or showing wear will not be judged.
- Please complete the entry form by printing or typing, or use an address label with complete information
- Exhibitors entering more than 20 exhibits must check in 1 hour before closing time.
- At the discretion of the Area Superintendent or management any exhibit deemed not worthy will not be exhibited.
- If item is disqualified, you will be notified.
- Any exhibit that deteriorates before the Fair closes will be removed from the display and disposed of at the discretion of the Superintendent or Management; ribbons will be held for the exhibitor.
- Liabilities: Every precaution will be taken to prevent loss and/or damage to entries, **HOWEVER**, entries are held or exhibited at the owner's risk.
- Due to health regulations all baked items entered in the Fair will not be returned.
- When it is obvious to the Judges that two or more exhibits are identical (as from the same cooking kettle), the judges **WILL** automatically disqualify ALL entries.
- The Danish System of Judging will apply to all AREAS EXCEPT Special Contests and Awards or otherwise indicated. Each entry is judged individually according to a standard. A Blue Ribbon means 1st Place, a Red Ribbon 2nd Place, a White Ribbon means 3rd Place. There can be more than one placing in each of these categories, if they meet the required standard. If an entry does not meet the required standard, then no ribbon is given.
- Premiums are paid from the records of the judges' sheets. Ribbons, tags, etc. have no value. In some areas we will be using the Point System. Points will be calculated into monetary value once all Fair Danish System Judging is complete.
- Late entries may be accepted for display only. They will not be judged
- All exhibits must remain in the Modern Living Building until the release date.
- No plastic or glued items - See Craft DIVISION

BAKING CLASSES:

Class: 1: Cakes

Exhibits shall be a whole cake (any size) frosting optional. You may enter up to 6 different types, all must be from a different recipe. Must state on entry exact description and name of entry. Cheesecake/Cakes requiring refrigeration will be judged but may not be displayed.

Class 2: Decorated Cakes

Categories:

- a). Occasional
- b). Specialty
- c) “Get Happy”

Cakes not cut, judged for decoration only. May use a cake form, If cake bases are over 11”x 15”and the height is over 24”, please call to make arrangements with the Superintendent. All cakes will be judged, however, all cakes may not be displayed due to space availability.

SCORING: Frosted Base- Appearance (smooth surface, straight sides).33%
Difficulty of Technique..... 34%
Originality 33%

Class 3: Candy & Confections

Candy or confection exhibits shall be 6 pieces. You may enter up to 6 different types, all must be from a different recipe. Must state on entry form exact description and name of entry.

Class 4: Cookies

Six cookies per exhibit are required. You may enter up to 6 different types, each must be from a different recipe. Must state on entry form exact description and name of entry.

Class 5: Pies & Pastry

Pie exhibits shall be one whole pie 6" to 9" in diameter. Chiffon, Cream, Custard, Cream Cheese or other pies requiring refrigeration will be accepted but may not be displayed. Please use disposable pans, the CWSF will not be responsible for the re-useable containers. You may enter up to 6 different types, each must be from a different recipe. Must state name and description on entry form.

Class 6: Quick Breads

Bread exhibits shall be one loaf any size. Doughnuts, corn sticks, muffin exhibits shall be 6. You may enter up to 6 different types, each must be from a different recipe. Must state on entry form exact description and name of entry.

Class 7: Yeast Breads & Rolls

Bread exhibit shall be one loaf any size. Roll exhibit shall be 6 pieces. Coffeecake shall be one whole cake any size. You may enter up to 6 different types, each must be from a different recipe. Must state on entry form exact description and name of entry.

Class 8: Bread Machine

Categories:

- a) Bread
- b) Rolls

Bread/Rolls will be judged on uniformity and taste. You may enter one item in each class. Bread exhibit will be one loaf, rolls will be six.

To speed up your entry time, you may pickup your entry forms and entry tags at the CWSF Office. If tags are done prior to entry, forms must be filled out to correspond with entry tags, i.e. exhibit number is the entry tag number and must be printed in the proper column on the entry form.

RULES:

Please read The General Rules and Regulations of the Fair, in addition to the following, are to be observed

- Entry form must be completed by exhibitor as to Variety, Exhibit number, Color and Class number if required. If you need assistance, please ask a Clerk.
- Containers will be furnished for Chrysanthemums, Dahlias, Flower Specimens, Glads and Roses. Containers for all other classes must be furnished by the exhibitor and should be plainly marked with name taped on the bottom of the container. The Fair management will not be responsible for the loss of containers or accessories.
- Specimens must be grown by exhibitor. Exhibitors are encouraged (specimens or designs) to change their flowers to keep the show looking fresh. Any deteriorated specimens will be removed and destroyed.
- Designs are to consist of naturally grown materials. No plastic flowers. Accessories permitted in designs.
- Competition is open to the public, all ages.
- Any flowers brought after specified deadline may be left for exhibition only if space permits.
- If an entrant has over 15 entries, please bring them at least 1/2 hour before deadline time.
- Whenever possible, flower exhibits should be named on entry form. If unsure of name, contact Superintendent and/or clerk for assistance.
- The Floral Exhibits will be judged on the Danish System. The Danish System is one in which each exhibit is judged on its own merit, not against another exhibit and receives either a 1st, 2nd, or 3rd. 1st and 2nd placings will receive a monetary award also but a 3rd place ribbon will not. The exhibit that is entered must be a quality one to receive an award.

Helpful Hints for Exhibitors:

- ❖ Make a list of possible entries early so they will be well groomed at entry time. Entries should be free of dust, mildew & insect damage.
- ❖ Dahlias and Chrysanthemums need to be in proportion with height and size of bloom. Dahlias need foliage to accompany bloom.
- ❖ Glads should be 1/3 bloom, 1/3bud, 1/3 closed.
- ❖ Roses need to be in bud 1/4 to 1/2 open.
- ❖ Specimens need to be one blooming stalk or three items with one flower per stem.
- ❖ Potted plants need to be clear of dried foliage.
- ❖ For those of you who have access to the internet, there are several good sites for information on dahlias (www.dahlia.org); chrysanthemums (www.mums.org); roses (www.ars.org).

- ❖ Pompon- Small, stiff, almost globular flowers - 1 spray
- ❖ Spider – 1 spray

DAHLIAS Division 2 - 1st & 2nd Half Show

- Must have attached foliage (at least one pair of leaves).
- Must be disbudded.
- No open centers except in novelties.
- Dahlia stems should be 3 different lengths.
- Dahlias will be judged on the following: Color, substance, form, size according to variety, stem & foliage, and bloom condition.
- You may enter any of the classes below and any number per class if the color and size is different. Example: Formal Decorative, 8” or over, color red and Formal Decorative, under 8”, color red.

Classes:

1. **Formal Decorative** - any size, 1 bloom – Ray florets flat, partially revolute, or partially involute. Petals uniform and regularly arranged, tending to recurve toward the stem.
2. **Informal Decorative** - any size, 1 bloom – Ray florets twisted, or curled, or wavy.
3. **Straight Cactus** - any size, 1 bloom – Ray florets revolute for more than ½ their length; pointed, straight, or recurved, radiating in all directions from the center.
4. **Semi-Cactus** - any size, 1 bloom – Ray florets broad at base, straight, incurved, or recurved; with ray florets revolute for up to ½ of their length.
5. **Laciniated** - The split should be in proportion to the ray floret length – an overall fringed effect.
6. **Water Lily** - Fully double and symmetrical petals.
7. **Miniatures** - any form – 3 blooms
8. **Best Basket of Miniatures** - any form
9. **Collarettes** - Open centered with a single row of uniform evenly spaced compound ray florets in a flat plain surrounding the disc flowers - 3 blooms
10. **Mini Ball** - 3 blooms – Fully double flowers, ball shaped or slightly flattened at the face.
11. **Pompon** - Fully double flowers similar to ball but more globular and smaller in size - 3 blooms
12. **Ball** - Fully double flowers, ball shaped or slightly flattened at the face, and the ray florets are blunt, rounded or indented - larger than 3” - 1 bloom
13. **Novelty** - Dahlias with characteristics differing from any other form presentation - 3 blooms
14. **Peony-Flowering** - Open centered with two or more rows of ray florets surrounding the disc flowers.
15. **Anemone** - With one or more rows of ray florets surrounding a center of elongated tubular disc florets.

GLADIOLI Division 3 - 1st & 2nd Half Show

Judging System: The Danish Judging System is one in which each exhibit is judged on its own merit, not against another exhibit and receives either a 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place ribbon. The American System is one in which entries are selected from all entries and judged against one another to receive the 1st, 2nd & 3rd places.

Danish Judging System is used unless it is noted that they will be judged on the American System.

Releasing: Monday Oct. 4th, 10 AM - 6PM. The Fair will dispose of exhibits not picked up by 6PM. You must have your claim check to pick up your entry. **NOTE:** Any entry that deteriorates before the Fair closes will be removed from the display and **disposed of.**

RULES

Please read **The General Rules & Regulations of the Fair, in addition to the following, are to be observed.**

- All exhibitors must be at least 3 years of age.

- All exhibits must be grown by the exhibitor or their immediate family. Exhibits will be of the current year's crop, and be properly labeled with the correct name.
- Selecting fruit for exhibit is judged according to size, quality, color, trueness to variety type, freedom from blemishes, uniform in size & mature. Quality should be of the highest. Fruits should retain their stems and must be free from bruises and broken skin. Color should be characteristic of the variety. Color may be brightened by polishing with a soft cloth. Fruit that has been artificially oiled or waxed will not qualify for awards. This includes fruit with Commercial Warehouse Wax. Prunes, plums and grapes should never be polished and on these it is best to retain all the natural bloom possible.
- Selecting vegetables for exhibit. Any produce for display should be well-grown, of highest quality and as nearly alike as possible. The Fair strives for quality; therefore we will reject entries that aren't up to quality standards. Please make sure there is no indication of disease or insects. Vegetables must be cleaned or will not be accepted.
- Entries will be displayed space permitting. Entries may be displayed in other areas of the Ag. Building or other buildings.
- You may enter any amount of fruit or vegetables.
- If the judges find no entry in a class that qualifies for a particular award, they may choose to omit that award.

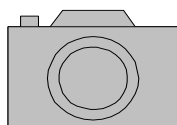

Independent judges will review each Grange Booth; points will be given and the total will be divided by three. If a tie occurs the judging team will re-evaluate the booths and with discussion break the tie. If the tie cannot be broken, one different judge will be called in to re-judge both booths.

- Painting of booths is not permitted except white on back and sides. Booths shall be left CLEAN at the end of the Fair. Flowers and fruits must be kept fresh.
- The judges will score on the following items for a possible maximum total of 1,000 points.
- These Points are to establish 1st thru 5th places and Participation.
 - Diversity of Products Shown.....150 Points
 - Quality of Products Shown150 Points
 - General Attractiveness.....400 Points
 - Theme Development.....150 Points
 - Education.....150 Points
 - “Waxing of apples is permissible.” Vegetable oil can be used.
- **Diversity of Products:** refers to the completeness with which the exhibit displays the various products grown in Washington. Products shown are limited to those produced in Washington and may be fresh, canned or dried. Non farm products are not to count in the calculation of points under Diversity. Each Display should include as many as possible of the following that are grown in Washington.
 - Hops, nuts, legumes, cereals, grains (sheaves and/or threshed) and corn (on ear and/or shelled ear.)
 - Fruits: tree fruits, small fruits, grapes, grape seeds and berries.
 - Wine, beer, juices and any processed/manufactured product - labels should indicate that item is made in Washington - avoid the look of Sponsorship by displaying more than one label.
 - Vegetables, root crops, herbs and flowers. Vegetables should be trimmed.
 - Livestock, poultry, fish products and honey. If using live bees, they must be contained.
 - Dairy (avoid fresh milk which sours and detracts from the exhibit). Use of cottage cheese or butter cartons is permitted.
 - Trees and/or wood by-products.

- **Quality:** refers to the character of the products shown. All produce should be of the best grade obtainable and should be uniform in size.
- **Theme Development:** means the working out of a unique or unusual idea, suitable for use as a central theme around which the display may be built. Theme is left entirely to the individual exhibitor.
- **Education:** should inform the Fairgoer about Agriculture. Educational signage should be large enough to read from 10 feet. It should convey the message in under one minute.
- **General Attractiveness:** refers to general balance, color and design, lighting effects, and eye appeal.
 - Floral decorations may be used, must be maintained throughout the fair.
 - Dried flowers & fresh flowers may count for quality or diversity of products. Artificial foliage may count for general attractiveness only.
 - Turntables, moving objects, colored lighting and special effects are permissible, If their use does not affect adversely any competitor's display.
- **Judging of Displays:** will commence Friday morning, Sept. 24th. The Judges will tally their scores and banners will be placed. All exhibits must be in place and ready for judging by 9:00 A.M., Friday, Sept. 24th. Exhibits not ready for judging will be penalized 50 points from their score.
- **Chairperson's Responsibility:** Each booth's chairperson is responsible for removing spoiled products and replacing them with fresh products to keep the booth attractive for the duration of the Fair. May do so, between 7:30 AM and 9:00 AM. You may still freshen up your booth after that time, but will not be able to park cars on the fairgrounds.
- **Judging of Junior Displays:** Will be done by the judging team that evaluates the Subordinate Granges, using the Subordinate Granges' point system. Nonagricultural products and events will be a part of diversity. When only one Junior Grange booth is displayed, the following point system will determine their placing for award: 1st: 900-1000; 2nd: 800-899; under 800, Other Award.

The exhibit that is entered must be a quality one to receive an award.

RULES

- Entry form must be completed by exhibitor as to Section, Exhibit number, Color and Class number if required. If you need assistance, please ask a Clerk.
- Containers will be furnished for Chrysanthemums, Dahlias, Flower Specimens, Glads and Roses. Containers for all other classes must be furnished by the exhibitor and should be plainly marked with name taped on the bottom of the container. The Fair management will not be responsible for the loss of containers or accessories.
- Specimens must be grown by exhibitor. Exhibitors are encouraged (specimens or designs) to change their flowers to keep the show looking fresh. Any deteriorated specimens will be removed and destroyed.
- Designs are to consist of naturally grown materials. No plastic flowers. Accessories permitted in designs.
- Competition is open to the public, all ages.
- Any flowers brought after specified deadline may be left for exhibition only if space permits.
- If an entrant has over 15 entries, please bring them at least 1/2 hour before deadline.
- Whenever possible, flower exhibits should be named on entry form. If unsure of name, contact Superintendent and/or clerk for assistance.

Helpful Hints for Exhibitors:

- Make a list of possible entries early so they will be well groomed at entry time. Entries should be free of dust, mildew & insect damage.
- Dahlias and Chrysanthemums need to be in proportion with height and size of bloom. Dahlias need foliage to accompany bloom.
- Glads should be 1/3 bloom, 1/3bud, 1/3 closed.
- Roses need to be in bud ¼ to ½ open.
- Specimens need to be one blooming stalk or three items with one flower per stem.
- Potted plants need to be clear of dried foliage.

- Selecting fruit for exhibit: is judged according to size, quality, color, trueness to variety type, freedom from blemishes, uniform in size, & mature. Quality should be of the highest. Fruits should retain their stems and must be free from bruises and broken skin. Color should be characteristic of the variety. Color may be brightened by polishing with a soft cloth. Fruit that has been artificially oiled or waxed will not qualify for awards. This includes fruit with Commercial Warehouse Wax. Prunes, plums and grapes should never be polished and on these it is best to retain all the natural bloom possible.
- Selecting vegetables for exhibit. Any produce for display should be well-grown, of highest quality and as nearly alike as possible.
- The Fair strives for quality; therefore we will reject entries that aren't up to quality standards. Please make sure there is no indication of disease or insects. Vegetables must be cleaned or will not be accepted.
- Entries will be displayed space permitting. Entries may be displayed in other areas of the Ag. Building or other buildings.

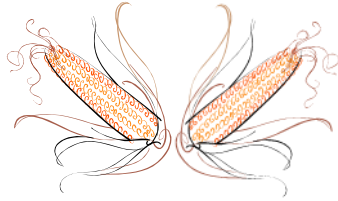

- b. Threshed- Grains should be plump and well matured, free from broken kernels and any foreign matter. Please use clean glass quart jars.

Class 3: GRASSES: Judges will consider leafiness and quality in addition to height. Sheaves should be about 4 inches in diameter at the base and tied in 3 places.

- May enter as many exhibits as you wish. Each entry must be from a different recipe or product. State on entry form exact type of exhibit. Food must be canned during the current year.
- Enter only researched recipes, on a 3x5 card, for all pickles, relishes and tomato-vegetable mixtures. Be sure to include your recipe source on entry form and label.
- All canned tomatoes must follow current recommendations. State on label if raw or hot packed and if processed in a weighted gauge or dial gauge pressure canner or in a boiling water canner.
- You must know your altitude to determine a safe processing time or canner pressure for canning foods.
- Directions for canning specify a 1/4" head space for jams & jellies; 1/2" for fruits & tomatoes processed in boiling water canner & 1 to 1-1/4" for low acid foods processed in a pressure canner.

- All products are to be exhibited in Clean Clear Standard Canning Jars. No gallon jars are to be used.
- Make your own label and put as much information as possible on it. Include product name; date; packing method; processing method; processing time & altitude. Attach label to back of entry tag. Products with no label, incomplete information on label, unsealed jars or unsafe processing methods, may be disqualified.
- . All entries must include recipes on "3 x 5" index card for each entry with your name on it or will be disqualified

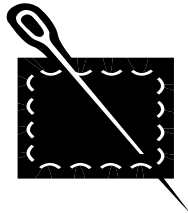

RV PARK RULES

Please leave your non-exhibited animals at home.

If you bring a pet with you the following does apply. Animals must be on a leash at all times under the owner's control. Never leave your animal unattended at your camping area. No animals allowed outside of RV Park except seeing-eye dogs. There will be no barking or vicious dogs (any vicious animal) allowed. If you have one, you will be asked to leave.

For those of you who wish to reserve an RV space for less than 5 days you must wait until September 11th to make that reservation. The cost per night is \$20.00. To insure a reservation prior to Sept. 11th you may pay the required 5 day fee of \$100.00.



CWSF RULES AND REGULATIONS

The Board of Directors of the Central Washington Fair Association has endeavored to make this Fair truly representative of the interests of Central Washington, and to provide wholesome and varied entertainment for the patrons. The Board will welcome suggestions for improving the Fair.

1. If the Fair shows a substantial income, the profit will be used to make a better Fair this year and for years to come. The Board expects to be able to pay all premiums in full, however, since the Fair must be self-sustaining, the Board reserves the right to make whatever reduction in premiums is necessary in order to avoid a deficit.
2. Any person knowingly violating any of the following rules of the Fair will thereby forfeit, and may be barred from receiving any premium that may be awarded him/her.
3. Due to fire regulations issued by the State Fire Marshal, no smoking will be permitted in Fair Buildings or Barns.
4. No one will be allowed to sleep in the Barns and Buildings
5. No alcoholic beverages will be allowed to be brought in by exhibitors or consumed in exhibit buildings and/or barns. The exception is The Wine Garden in the Ag Building, Beer Tents and Cantina, where alcohol will be sold.
6. Food handlers and vendors must comply with state laws and local regulations pertaining to health certificates and health ordinances. They must be dressed in a neat and clean manner. Food supplies must be pure and wholesome. Concessionaires must confine themselves to assigned space.
7. **Only animals entered for competition are permitted except assistance animals accompanying persons with disabilities.**
8. The owner of exhibit or exhibits will be solely responsible for any consequential or other loss, injury or damage done to or occasioned by or arisen from, any animal exhibited by him/her and will releases the Central Washington Fair Association from any liability from loss, damage or injury to livestock, fair patrons, or other property while such is on the grounds of the Central Washington State Fair. Should the Central Washington Fair Association file suit or action against any exhibitor on any cause, the exhibitor agrees to pay to the Fair Association such reasonable sums, as attorney fees, as the court having jurisdiction of the case may determine. Livestock exhibitors will at all times give necessary and personal attention to their stock and at the close of the Fair must take entire charge of and remove the same promptly. No officer or employee of the Fair has authority to suspend or change this rule.
9. All entries must be on official entry forms which may be obtained by contacting the Central Washington State Fair Office, 1301 S. Fair Avenue, Yakima, WA 98901, Phone: (509)-248-7160. (See also your department rules regarding entry requirements). Entry forms must be properly filled in and signed. All entry fees are nonrefundable after Sept. 1, 2009. A \$20.00 office charge per exhibitor will be charged on all entry refunds up to this date. After Sept. 1, NO REFUNDS unless extenuating circumstances exist. Written requests will be reviewed and if approved, an additional \$20.00 will be charged per exhibitor (total \$40.00). You must have a letter from the Veterinarian and a letter requesting a refund detailing all fees that are being requested. If entries are made after the closing dates there will be an additional charge per entry. NSF checks will be charged a \$50.00 fee in addition to the amount of the check. If you have any outstanding entry fees or check fees those will need to be paid before premium checks are issued.
10. The management reserves the right to accept, reject entirely, or accept conditionally any entry or applications.

EXHIBITORS

11. Most of the people who come to the Fair do so in order to see the exhibits of superior livestock and other products of the farm, the home and the factory. In order to offer an attractive and interesting fair, exhibits must be kept in place through the closing day. The exact time at which displays may be removed is listed in the rules. No article or animal may be removed before such time without special permission of the manager, and any article or animal removed without such permission will forfeit any premiums won. Exhibits must stay in department area for all 10 days of the Fair unless management displays them elsewhere.
12. Entries are open to all youth. Entries may be made by youth in grade 1 (age 6 after January 1, of present year) through grade 12 (or can be 19 years of age if birthday is after January 1, of present year.) No married exhibitors may enter the Youth Livestock Department. Age limits will vary within areas so please check the area you wish to enter.
13. Exhibitors must be at least 6 years old to enter the Open Class Livestock Department unless otherwise stated within the department. In livestock departments that have only one exhibitor, will not be shown for competition, the animals entered will be paid as a display exhibit only and not for competition.
14. Exhibitors must prepare and decorate their own booths. Concessionaires or renters of booth space are required to keep their spaces neat and clean.
15. All decorating on the Fairgrounds, in or out of buildings, must be done with flameproof type products.

YOUTH LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS

16. There will be separate sections available for 4-H and FFA if those groups would like to decorate as a group. Each will be allotted space according to number of animals entered. Members of these groups are encouraged to decorate by clubs and chapters. You must notify the Superintendent, on entry form, if you wish to decorate as a group.
17. When showing Dairy Cattle and Dairy Goats, white must be worn.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS – YOUTH SHOW

18. Entries in livestock breeding classes are open to classes listed. Entries in market classes of livestock may be grade or crossbred. Exhibitors of livestock may enter two animals in one class. Exhibits entered in the wrong classes may be reclassified at the discretion of Superintendent.

AWARDS & PREMIUMS

19. Judges must not award a prize to any unworthy exhibit. It is the intention of the Fair that no premium or distinction of any kind shall be given to any animal or article that is not deserving. The CWSF will do its best to make sure that all prizes & premiums are paid. If you think that your item should have received premiums & you have not received a check by December 1st, 2010, please call the CWSF office. After January 1st, 2011 we will no longer honor the 2010 awards.

YOUTH AWARDS AND PREMIUMS

20. No animals unworthy shall be awarded a premium.
21. No exhibit shall be awarded a Championship ribbon unless of exceptional quality regardless of competition. Animals not properly fitted & trained for showing will be rejected at the discretion of show officials.
22. In the Livestock Division, Jr. & Sr. Champions, Grand Champions, and Res. Champions will be selected where designated from among the blue ribbon exhibits only. No points will be awarded and no premiums paid on Championship Classes.

JUDGING – YOUTH SHOW

23. Judges have the right to recommend No Placement and Premiums when disciplinary problems, in regards to conduct in the show-ring exists. the Fair Board. Note Health Regulations in Open Livestock Rules

1099 INFORMATION

If you are expecting to receive \$600.00 or more in premiums, premium checks will not be issued unless we have **a social security number or I.D. number of the owner in addition to the ranch name.**

24. Management and/or Superintendents, reserve the right to cancel the class where there is no competition, or where there are fewer entries in a class than number of premiums offered. Judges may, in their discretion, award premiums of such grade as the exhibitor deserves. No award will be made for champions unless there is sufficient competition as determined by the judge. If an exhibit does not qualify for a listed class, that exhibit will be entered under a miscellaneous class, if a miscellaneous class exists. If not enough exhibits are entered in an American-judged department, one or all classes may be canceled.

25. If our judging staff deems that any entry is of professional quality, it will be judged in the professional category.

26. No person shall be allowed, under any circumstances, to interfere with the judges during their adjudication, or with the Fair's staff, or to offer any criticism of an exhibit of another. Violators of this rule shall be excluded immediately from the judging area and from competition and be subject to such additional penalties, including cancellation of awards, as the management shall consider proper.

27. The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases under their jurisdiction except where mistake, fraud, misrepresentation or collusion, not discovered at the time of the award is proven. In such cases, the authority of Management shall be final.

28. Should any animal or article awarded a prize be disqualified, the one gaining the lower prize shall graduate up into the higher position next in order above them, if in the opinion of the judge they are worthy of such prize

29. No exhibitor may receive more than (1) cash award in any one class, unless otherwise stated.

30. Premiums are paid only from the records of the Judge's sheet. Ribbons, tags or cards have no value as to payment. Premium checks will be payable to the person whose name is on the entry form. Animal entries must be entered under the owner's name - see livestock rule #4.

31. Checks must be cashed within six months of issue date. This rule is strictly enforced. Please cash premium checks when you receive them. They will not be honored after six months and will not be reissued. Lost or stolen checks will not be reissued. Ribbons and Rosettes that are lost or stolen will not be replaced.

PROTESTS

32. Superintendents shall have authority over all matters within their respective areas, subject to the Management. Protest of decisions may be submitted to the Board whose decision is final. All protests must be in writing and accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be delivered to the manager within (24) hours after the cause of protest.

PARKING

33. Cars will be towed away from designated parking if left overnight or are without a proper sticker, and impounded at owner's expense and risk.

34. Large trucks that are not being moved daily may be parked in a designated area.

35. At 9:00 AM every day, all vehicles must be moved from within the Fairgrounds gate to designated parking areas or they will be impounded at the owner's risk and expense.

36. Parking credentials will be required at Gate 11. We are no longer using Dalton Lane as an entrance.

DEPARTURES

37. All exhibitors picking up their exhibits and/or displays will be required to have some form of ID to indicate ownership. Also check department rules pertaining to release.

RULES & REGULATIONS STATEMENT

The Fair Board has made every effort to make these rules and regulations definite and clear, but reserve the final and absolute right to interpret them as may become necessary, settle controversies arising out of, connected with, or incident to the Fair.

LIVESTOCK ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

1. All animals entered in breeding classes must be registered in the respective association herd books, and registry papers must be provided for each animal.

2. Central Washington State Fair will pay on two entries (maximum) per class in the livestock area. No exhibitor and/or owner shall be permitted to make more than (2) entries under each class. Individual department rules will apply. Exhibitor/owner is defined as the name specified on registration papers. Animals under multiple exhibitor names will be considered as (1) exhibitor. If a husband, wife or child are co-owners of an entry they will be considered as (1) exhibitor and passes will be issued as such. Premium checks will be made payable to one legal owner only.

3. An animal may compete in one single class and in all group or specials to which it is eligible. Individual animals shown in all of the group and herd classes must have been entered and shown in one of the classes for single animals.

4. Animals exhibited must be owned by exhibitor and entered in their name unless otherwise noted in Breed Rules and other livestock rules.

5. Entries should not be made for championships or for special prizes. Eligible animals will be automatically entered by the clerks. Entries for groups must be made, but the individual animals making up the groups need not be specified until shown. All animals on the grounds must be entered in the proper classes.

6. Temporary transfer/sale to make competition is barred.

7. Cows over 42 months of age & bulls over 36 months of age must show proof of living calf within 12 months prior to date of show. Nurse cows prohibited unless otherwise stated in breed rules.

8. The Superintendent or Management may reclassify animals entered in the wrong classes. Exhibitors are not allowed to withdraw or change their entries after the opening of the fair.

9. Youth may also show in open division, but must meet all open rules, registration, entry fees and closing dates.

10. Judges may not enter for competition in their respective departments.

11. Substitutions may be made only in the same class of original entry and completed at least 24 hours prior to time judging is scheduled.

12. Entries will be accepted until such time as all available stalls/pens are filled. Determination will be done on post date and/or requirements set forth by management pertaining to number.

13. Animals must be shown in such a manner as the judges may require or allow. Exhibitors refusing for any cause not meeting with the approval of the Management to lead out their animals for parade or competition to the Show Ring, or for Student's Judging Contests, when called by the stewards, will not only forfeit all prizes previously won, but may be barred from further participation in the Fair. They may be further required to remove their stock from the Fair grounds.

14. Good herdsmanship must be maintained at all times. Failure to provide herdsmanship may result in class premiums withheld. See Herdsmanship Rule in its entirety above each Livestock Department.
15. Stall Cards – Youth Department: Each exhibitor must display a stall card for each animal entered. If you are entering both youth and open, you must use the youth card which will be a colored card. The card must be filled on its entirety including your name, etc. The stall cards will be provided to you by the CWSF, available through your superintendent or in the livestock office. The YOUTH DEPARTMENT must use the colored cards that we provide. By using these youth cards we are now able to house the youth entries with the open class. The stall cards may be picked up at the Livestock Office. Open Department: Each exhibitor must display a white stall card for each farm or exhibitor. If you have any questions, please contact the Entry Department at 509-248-7160.
16. If entry numbers (animal number) are required, they must be prominently displayed on the person showing the animal in the judging ring.
17. Tampering and misrepresentation - any artificial means of removing or remedying the physical defects or conformation in exhibition of cattle will be considered as fraud and deception. All animals giving evidence of such treatment will be barred from competition. Misrepresentation of age of animal will also be considered fraudulent. Any use of illegal drugs and/or the improper use of animal health products or foreign substances that would affect an animal's performance resulting in an unfair advantage or the disposition of the animal will not be tolerated.
18. THEFT- if you are caught stealing- premiums will be pulled and future entries at CWSF may be rejected.
19. Exhibitors will not construct barricades in their area that obstruct public viewing from any angle. Personal items are not to be left out in the open after 9:30 am each day of the Fair. Tack areas and unused stalls must be kept clean and neat at all times or premiums may be held. No radios or televisions played in barns during Fair hours. The sound interferes with the barn paging system when classes are being called. Exhibitors must provide their own wheelbarrows and cleaning equipment. No aisle grooming of your animal.
20. All exhibits must be held in place until release time unless granted written permission by the Department Superintendent or Management. A Veterinarian's certificate will be accepted as proof of death or sickness of an animal and upon such presentation, substitutions will be permitted in the same class only, provided such proof is presented at least 24 hours before they show. After that no substitutions may be made. NO refunds. This rule applies to all classes, Open and Youth.
21. All Livestock Departments: No selling of animals allowed during the Fair unless prior arrangements have been made, i.e. commercial space. NO FOR SALE signs allowed on pens, stalls or coops, etc.
22. Containers used to store animal feed should be rodent proof.

ARRIVALS & DEPARTURES

You will be parking in our infield going in at Gate 11 into the parking area. Please use the yellow gate & walk thru the tunnel for entrance to the Fairgrounds.

Please attend the Livestock Meeting for 1st Half & 2nd Half at 1PM

First half livestock will be released on September 28th, please see number 24 below. Second half livestock will be released at 8:00 PM on October 3rd. Barns will close at 7:30 PM at which time security will install the banner line to secure livestock area. Gators and drivers will be available to assist you in hauling your tack and/or display items

23. Any 1st Half Livestock in the barns after the release deadline will be tied or caged behind the barns at the owner's risk.
 24. Changeover: Barns will be closed at 5:30 PM Tuesday, September 28th. To assure guest safety no access will be allowed in the livestock area once the banner line has been installed. We are hopeful that we may clear the barn and livestock areas of fairgoers by 6:00 PM, at which time exhibitors may finish hauling their tack and decorations. Please do not dismantle any displays or decorations until 6:00 PM. Once this procedure is completed we will have a general release with an estimated release time of 6:30 PM. Please keep in mind that this depends on getting the barn areas cleared of fairgoers in a timely fashion. You will be informed by your superintendent of a definite release time once management (Livestock Administrator, Joe Niemann) feels it is safe for everyone. Long hauls will be given consideration for an earlier release if it is safe to do so. Gators and drivers will be available to assist you in hauling your tack and/or display items.
 25. Hauling animals prohibited during the Fair except during release and entering times. Loading and unloading animals should be done as quickly as possible. Loading and unloading inside the barns is prohibited. There will be a maximum time of 20 minutes per vehicle to park in designated area to load and unload. If more time is needed, please make arrangements with the Livestock Administrator.
- Livestock Sales:** Sale animals must participate in entire Fair process. You cannot leave with the sold animal prior to release time. Taking out any animals early, sold or not, will result in premiums being lost to the seller and/or buyer, no exceptions. Sales/Auctions: CWSF will receive 1.5% of gross sales. The Association may provide panels/fencing if needed.* *If Fair provides 2.5% will be charged.

LIVESTOCK SALES/JUNIOR SHOWS

Animals entered in Jr. Shows, organized by their respective associations, must be entered in the Youth Show or Open Class Show and must participate in the entire Fair process & pay the proper fees.

FEED & BEDDING

26. All livestock will use straw except horse exhibitors that have made prior arrangements with their superintendent if they wish to use shavings. Straw for first bedding will be provided to exhibitors that have chosen to use straw by CWSF. If shavings are used, no straw will be issued to these exhibitors. Shaving removal is their responsibility. Bedding for the tie-out area will not be furnished.
27. Additional bedding, straw and hay, may be purchased on the grounds through a private vendor. Central Washington State Fair will not be handling hay/straw sales. The location and times you can purchase will be posted in the Livestock Office.
28. Straw removal from other exhibitor's areas will mean a loss of premiums.
29. The Central Washington State Fair will furnish grain for cows while being milked in the milking parlor. Milk produced will not be paid for and will become the property of the Central Washington State Fair to help pay for the parlor setup.
30. Keep all grain in a sealed container (related to rodent control).

BLOCKING CHUTES

31. Absolutely no blocking chutes will be permitted in front of the barns (west end) or inside the barn area. A designated area will be reserved on the east end. The Blocking Chute area will be on a first-come first-serve basis. Premiums may be held if chutes are not kept clean at all times or if they are placed inside the barns without management permission.

TIE-OUTS

32. Tie-outs will be permitted at 8:00 PM. A limited number of tie-outs will be offered on a first-come first-serve basis. If tie-outs are used, exhibitor must clean the area. Old straw must be replaced by new daily. This rule will be strictly enforced. Bedding for tie-out area will not be furnished. Both a halter and neck rope must secure all animals in tie-outs.

**** HERDSMANSHIP RULE ****

33. **With the serious concerns of Ecoli issues at Fairs and Festivals, we are asking your cooperation and understanding to please keep your stalls and/or pens and aisles clean at all times. Good herdsmanship will be enforced in all of the livestock areas. Those not keeping their areas clean will be issued a warning. If after the warning stalls and/or pens are not maintained, the exhibitor will be contacted, and we may find it necessary to hold premiums. Ecoli outbreaks are extremely detrimental to our industry and we need to address it by being pro-active. We suggest that you clean your stalls and/or pens and aisles completely out by 10:00 AM each day and throughout the day perform cleaning maintenance. We realize that completely cleaning pens and stalls out is time consuming and costly, however having you, your animals and fairgoers safe is high priority. We do appreciate your assistance in helping us deal with these concerns.**

DEPT OF AG LIVESTOCK HEALTH REGULATIONS

1. Our State Health Permit number is 91-WA -0944. Out of state exhibitors may use this number on health certificates for the CWSF only. Your veterinarians do not need to call the Department of Agriculture if you use this number.
2. Individual health certificates on Washington animals are not required for entry. The Fair Vet shall issue a blanket health certificate covering all instate entries to the Fair.
3. No animal from a quarantined area or premise will be permitted to enter the Fair or to show.
4. Out-of-state animal entries must comply with state of Washington import regulations. no exemptions unless exempted by rule.
5. Fair veterinarian will inspect all classes of livestock and poultry (including horses, pet animals, rabbits, fur-bearing animals, pigeons, ducks, geese & turkeys) before they are exhibited, to determine that the livestock and poultry show no clinical indications of contagious, infectious disease and ectoparasites.
6. Fair veterinarian will reject any animal with infectious or contagious diseases or ectoparasites. Exhibitors should be made aware that ringworm, warts, pinkeye, strangles, contagious ecthyma, scabies, lice, mites, ticks and fleas fall into these categories.
7. Animals exhibiting disease symptom during the course of the Fair should be rejected by the Fair veterinarian and removed from exhibit area.
8. It is strongly recommended, but not required, that cattle be vaccinated in the current show year against respiratory diseases.
9. The Fair Veterinarian's professional decision as to the health status of an animal is final and shall be upheld by the Fair Board.

SPECIAL RULE - PUBLIC LAW

ANIMAL ENTERPRISE PROTECTION ACT OF 1992 – Section 43 – an act to protect Animal Enterprises.

a. OFFENSE

Whoever travels in interstate or foreign commerce, or uses or causes to be used the mail or any facility in interstate or Foreign commerce for the purpose of causing physical disruption to the functioning of an animal enterprise; and Intentionally causes physical disruption to the functioning of an animal enterprise by intentionally stealing, damaging, or causing the loss of, any property (including animals or records) used by the animal enterprise, and thereby causes economic damage exceeding \$10,000 to that enterprise or conspires to do so; shall be fined under this title or imprisoned not more than one year, or both.

TREATMENT OF LIVESTOCK

Mistreatment of animals will not be tolerated. If such an occurrence happens, the exhibitor will be asked to leave and all premiums will be forfeited.

CATTLE: Out of State Beef cattle may go to fairs without a test for Brucellosis from the free states of Idaho, Montana and Oregon. Dairy females 20 months of age and vaccinated and bulls six months of age from these states will need to be tested for Brucellosis if there is a chance they will be sold. No test is required if for show only and return. Cattle coming from all other free and A states need to be tested, whether beef or dairy, using the ages of 20 months for dairy and 24 months for beef females who are strain 19 vaccinates, six months for bulls and RB 51 vaccinates. Non-vaccinates may be exhibited, provided they are tested negative for Brucellosis, over four months of age and provided the Fair board rules allow non-vaccinates to be exhibited.

HORSES: Out of State Horses (6) months of age and older need to be negative to an EIA test within (6) months of entry except horses from Oregon.

LLAMAS: Out of State Llamas and Alpacas (6) months of age and over must be tested negative for Brucellosis and tuberculosis not more than 30 days prior to entry. The tuberculosis test is to be performed just caudal to the elbow joint in a similar manner to the single strength single cervical test.

POULTRY: All Poultry going to exhibit must test negative for Salmonella pullorum typhoid (P-T)' This rule applies to chickens, exotic fowl, and game birds; but excludes waterfowl, doves and pigeons. **Birds under the age of 16 weeks do not need to be tested for P-T.** Exhibitors that meet one of the two options below do not need to have their birds P-T tested prior to exhibit:

1. The exhibitor is a participant in the National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP); or
2. Within the past twelve months, the show birds were brought from
 - a. NPIP participants;
 - b. Hatcheries; or
 - c. Feed Store

Keep Exotic Newcastle Disease out of Washington

Exotic Newcastle Disease is a deadly disease caused by a virus. The extremely contagious disease affects all species of birds and is spread by contact with infected birds or materials contaminated with the virus. It does not pose a human health threat and does not affect the safety of chicken meat or eggs. Exotic Newcastle Disease has not been detected in Washington and the Washington State Department of Agriculture (WSDA) is working with the poultry and egg industries to keep it out.

WSDA prohibits moving from some California and Nevada counties into Washington

Effective January 15, 2003 WSDA adopted a rule that prohibits moving all bird species from California and Nevada counties that have been placed under quarantine by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

OUT –OF-STATE-SHEEP-AND-GOATS: All sheep and goats are required to have a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and all rams require an entry permit number. All sheep and goats must have official scrapie identification. Sheep and goats from Idaho and Oregon on a round trip of 96 hours or less are exempt from the requirement of a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection provided the fair/show management provides veterinary inspection on arrival and rejects any unhealthy animals. For stays longer than 96 hours they must have a Certificate of Veterinary inspection. If lactating goats are entering, their milk must be discarded during any stay in Washington unless they have been tested for Brucellosis, Tuberculosis and Q Fever.

GOATS: Only goats being sold into goat dairies need to be tested negative for Brucellosis within thirty days prior to date of entry. If they are for show & return only, no test required. If any lactating goats are shown, their milk must be discarded during any stay in Washington unless goats are tested for Brucellosis.

SHEEP: All breeding rams six months of age and over must have a negative ELISA test for broccoli ovis within (30) days prior to entry into Washington and be palpated and certified free of unless for show and return and be palpated and certified free of brucella ovis or be from a brucella free flock, unless for show and return. Each ram must be individually identified with an individual ear tag or registration tattoo.

SWINE: Out of State feeder and breeder swine must be tested negative to Pseudorabies within (30) days prior to entry except swine originating from a pseudorabies qualified negative herd where the qualifying test has been conducted within (60) days of shipment and all new additions since the test have been tested negative or are from states classified as Stage IV or V by the pseudorabies eradication committee. Swine (6) months and over must be negative to a Brucellosis test (30) days prior to entry except swine originating from a validated Brucellosis free herd or state or area.

2010 MEDAL OF EXCELLENCE North American Limousin Foundation Standard Rules & Regulations For the Exhibition of Limousin Cattle Level II /III

1. Animals must be registered with the North American Limousin Foundation (NALF), Embryo Transfer (ET) calves with pending registration must have parentage-verification paperwork in the NALF system.
2. Animals must be 75% Limousin (NALF percentage, not actual) or greater as indicated on NALF registration certificates. "Percentage" and "purebred" Limousin cattle with orange registration certificates shall compete in the same classes and championships.
3. Animals must be properly tattooed and will be inspected at the show. Tattoos must be legible and match the the registration certificates. If an animal's tattoo is not legible or cannot be read upon initial processing, it will be ineligible to show and not be allowed to return with a new or corrected tattoo.
4. To maintain a high degree of confidence in Limousin shows, NALF reserves the right to disqualify any animal that has been fitted in an unethical manner. Unethical fitting shall include the following.

- a) Any use of paints, hair coloring conditioners, colored show foam, graphite, colored powders or other substances; animals may be subject to white- towel test;
- b) The addition of any hair or hair like substances, including false tail heads and false polls (false tail switches are allowed);
- c) The cutting , tearing or gluing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal, or the injection of any gas, solid or liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation;
- d) Any products, solutions, or liquids administered internally or externally to alter the conformation of the animal is prohibited. That includes the use of steroids, growth stimulants and the act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method.

EXCEPTIONS: In the case of severely sick or dehydrated animals, the exhibitor may have fluids or electrolytes administered by the licensed official show veterinarian with the approval of the show superintendent or NALF representative. This exception is not applicable on show day or weigh-in/check-in day.

5. Bulls over one (1) year of age must show with a nose lead. The Limousin show superintendent and the show management reserve the right to disqualify animals deemed unmanageable.
6. Protests against exhibitors, individual animals or fitting violations must be submitted in writing, signed by five (5) active members of the NALF and presented to the show superintendent within 12 hours after the show's completion.
7. The North American Limousin Foundation reserves the right to mouth animals for dental development.
8. NALF reserves the right to collect hair samples from any animal.
9. Classes and championship breaks will be determined after all cattle have been checked in. No class shall contain more than 20 head or have an age spread of more than 60 days unless the animals are older than two years.
10. Calves exhibited alongside dams in the cow/calf division are eligible to show as individuals in the **Lim-Flex show** (if offered), as long as the calf is registered and qualifies as determined by registration papers from NALF.
11. Animals shown must be solid red or black above the flanks, excluding birth marks.

OTHER REQUIREMENTS

The following performance-data-submission requirements must be met by December 1, to receive Medal of Excellence points.

- a. Birth Weight (bulls & heifers)
- b. Weaning Weight (bulls & heifers)
- c. Yearling Weight (bulls & heifers)
- d. Yearling scrotal circumference
- e. Pregnancy test (female older than 600 days at season's end)
- f. Breeding Soundness Exam & Semen Test (bulls older than 400 days)

NOTE: Failure to have performance data on file at NALF by the deadline will result in disqualification from the MOE program, and no points will be awarded. It is the responsibility of the breeder/owner/exhibitor to submit that information without special requests from NALF.

Credibility Requirements: To maintain a high degree of integrity and credibility in all Limousin shows, all owners and exhibitors are expected to adhere to all NALF rules and regulations regarding the exhibition of Limousin cattle and to adhere to rules and regulations of particular shows, fairs and exhibitions.

 - b) The addition of any hair or hair like substances, including false tailheads and false polls (false tail switches are allowed);

- c) The cutting, tearing or gluing of the hide or underneath the hide or removal of tissue in an attempt to alter the shape of the animal or the injection of any gas, solid or liquid under the hide to alter the normal conformation;

An animal is eligible to enter or compete in an open Charolais breeding class if registered in country of origin outside the United States and is eligible for purebred registry in the AICA Herdbook.

Animals registered in the AICA Colored Division Registry (QF and QM initialed registration numbers) must meet the perimeters of the AICA Color Card.

All animals to be eligible may be approved by a sifting committee designated by the AICA. Stall space will not be provided for any Charolais cattle that have not been accepted by the sifting committee.

All animals are subject to a medical examination in order to determine age, and each animal will be present in the show ring in its natural conformation without alteration or modification. Use of artificial tailheads is not permitted.

All animals shown in individual classes must be weaned, with the exception of the Cow-Calf Class and calves at the side of females calved after September 1, 2008. Calves at side must be purebred and registered with the AICA. Females calved after September 1, 2008, must show in individual female class appropriate to age. Nurse cows are not permitted.

All females 20 months and older exhibited at AICA sanctioned shows must be accompanied by a certificate of pregnancy from a licensed veterinarian or have produced fertile eggs as certified in a written statement by a licensed veterinarian or embryologist or have a calf at side.

AICA requires that all animals be shown with a halter and suggest that all bulls be shown with a nose lead.

ALL EXHIBITS OF CHAROLAIS BREEDING CATTLE SHALL BE GOVERNED BY THE AICA RULES AND REGULATIONS, ARTICLE XV, TITLED EXHIBITION OF ANIMALS. THE INSPECTION OF EXHIBIT CATTLE IS SPECIFIED IN ARTICLE XV, PARAGRAPH C, OF THE ASSOCIATION RULES AND REGULATIONS AND NON-COMPLIANCE OF EXHIBIT INSPECTION IS SPECIFIED IN PARAGRAPH D OF THE SAME ARTICLE XV.

ARTICLE XV, PARAGRAPH B, POINT 2: "Each animal will be presented in its natural conformation and structure without alteration or modification. Alteration or modification shall be defined to include any surgical, chemical, electrical or other (including banding or other circulatory constriction) appearance change for cosmetic purpose, save only branding, tattooing, foot

trimming or dehorning. The act of artificially filling animals internally, which would include stomach pumping, drench tubes, or any other method per os (by esophagus) is prohibited. Silicone injection or other injection for cosmetic purpose shall be prohibited. Anabolic steroid use shall likewise be prohibited and any animal testing positive for anabolic steroid or diuretic use shall be presumed to be altered and modified.”

Effective October 22, 2004, at any American-International Charolais Association (AICA) sanctioned show (including shows receiving AICA premium funding and/or qualifying as a Roll of Excellence Show), the use of a coloring agent, flock and powder is prohibited. Use of these products will result in the immediate disqualification of a given animal at such show.

Where circumstances exist and / or allow, AICA reserves the right to split large individual classes after the check-in procedure is complete.

3. All dairy cows must have sound udders.

4. All lactating cows must be milked in the milking parlor.

Please state on entry form if entry is lactating and will need to be milked. Must list animal and how many. If this changes prior to Fair, between Sept. 1 and entry day, changes must be reported to the entry office.

5. Milk through the parlor will become the property of the Central Washington State Fair to help pay for parlor setup and improvements.

6. The show ring code of ethics, recommended by the Purebred Dairy Cattle Association, will be followed.

7. No nurse cows will be permitted.

8. All cattle entered for competition must be made available for special judging contests if requested by the management. Management will make every effort to insure that animals used in such contests will be properly handled. Class selections for contests will be made by the personnel in charge.

9. The competition for Reserve Championship shall include the animal winning second place in individual classes which furnishes the Grand Champion, in addition to the first prize winners in all other classes.

NOTE: Horses must be led from the barns to arenas. Riding is not allowed to or from arenas at any time. Failure to obey this rule may forfeit premiums earned.

1. Adverse Treatment- Absolutely no ill- treatment of your animal will be allowed. If observed doing so, you will be requested to leave and premiums will be pulled.

2. Post entry and class changes will be accepted for one hour prior to the beginning of the day's show, and ½ hour following each show session. None will be accepted during the show session or just prior to a session.

3. Entries

- Entries submitted without proper registration papers or without classes listed, or without correct amount of fees will be returned and must be corrected and resubmitted. No stalls will be reserved without correct fees for stalls and classes entered on the entry forms.
- All classes must be paid for prior to the end of Fair. Entry Fees can not be taken out of premiums received.
- Entries are accepted on a "First come basis." The number of horses that can be accommodated at the Fair is limited. Once full, a waiting list will be started and entries will be taken from this list in order as cancellations are received.
- Entry Form not valid until signed by owner, and if a junior owner or rider, by parent or guardian.
- Please **PRINT** your name on the entry form clearly.
- **Age of rider is required on entry form. (all ages, all entrants) Rider's age is noted "as of January 1st of current year."**

4. Credential : Credential packets will be issued from your Superintendent at livestock meeting depending on 1st half or 2nd half of Fair.

5. Registration papers: Photocopies of Registration Papers or breeding certificate for each animal entered, showing the **CORRECT OWNER**, animal's **SIRE AND DAM** must accompany the entry form or entry form will be returned.

Exception: For horses under one year of age, a confirmation paper showing that registration is being applied for or a signed statement explaining that the animal is eligible for registration and it has been applied for is acceptable, providing the name and number of the sire and dam are included. The Paint/Pinto sections require registration in at least one of the Pinto or Paint Associations.

6. Stabling:

- All stalls and tack rooms will be assigned on a first-come/first served basis with last year's location given first priority if possible.
- Exhibitors wishing to stable together **MUST** submit their request on the entry form. Requests and locations are not guaranteed. No exceptions.
- No sleeping in the Barns allowed.
- Grooming and tacking up must be done in stall or designated stall for that purpose; must not be done in the aisle-way during time the Fair is open to the public. This is very dangerous and must be discontinued. Premiums may be withheld if this occurs and a fine of \$25.00 each time will be assessed. This is a dangerous practice.
- No Switching of stalls without permission of Superintendent.
- One horse per stall except mare with suckling foals (this must be designated on the entry blank).

NOTE: Exhibitors who end up bringing fewer horses than they have rented stalls for will have the stalls reverted back to the Fair. The stalls will then be offered to those people on the waiting list before being made available to the original exhibitor for storage. Such offers can take place up through 9:00 am, Wed. Sept. 15th. **NO REFUNDS on any stalls after Sept.1.**

7. Tackroom Fee:

- Tackrooms are \$10.00 per user (shared or single occupancy) and your request for a tackroom must be noted on your entry form.
- There are approximately 30 tackrooms available and they will be assigned on a “first come basis.” Management reserves the right to assign more than one exhibitor to a tackroom.
- No refunds of any tackroom fee after September 1.

8. BEDDING:

- All livestock will use straw except horse exhibitors that have made prior arrangements with their superintendent if they wish to use shavings.
- Straw for first bedding will be provided to exhibitors that have chosen to use straw by CWSF.
- If shavings are used, no straw will be issued to these exhibitors. Shaving removal is their responsibility.

9. WEANLING & SUCKLING FOALS: must be four months of age by Fair time in order to be entered. Suckling foals (accompanied by their dam, which also must be entered in the Fair, and still nursing) may be of any age. However, owners should be aware of risks involved in exposing a young animal to a large number of other horses.

10. CHAMPIONSHIP & BEST OF BREED CLASSES: Horses winning first and second place in regular halter classes must show in the Championship class or forfeit all prizes previously won. All Champion & Reserve Champions MUST show in Best of Breed or forfeit all prize money previously won. All Breed Classes will be held on Thursday, September 23rd, including Best of Breed Classes.

11: Other Requirements:

- Horses must be led from the barns to the arena. No riding in the Arena with a halter, horses must be in a bridle.
- Horses are not to be led or rode out of designated areas. The designated areas are from the horse barns to the cross walk, Durand and Warm Up Arenas. No horses are to be beyond Barn D to the south and Barn B to the north.
- Please stay out of the cattle area.
- Get of Sire Class requires 3 get. Produce of Dam requires 2 produce.
- Exhibitors must scratch classes at the show office, not at the paddock in gate unless it is an emergency.
- Patterns will be posted one hour before each class.

CLASS RULES:

All classes will follow Central Washington State Fair and Washington and Oregon State Association Breed Rules, and use USAE Standard Rules as a guideline, unless otherwise stated. Breed rules only apply to respective breeds and not to open or equitation classes. **Classes with less than (3) entries may be combined or canceled and premiums paid accordingly.** Exhibitors are urged to use caution when entering restricted classes to be sure your entry is eligible as entered (i.e. novice, maiden, limit, green etc.) Entry in a class for which the horse is not eligible may be reason for forfeiture of all prize money earned.

1. In the Western section, snaffle or hackamores (other than mechanical) will be allowed on horse's 5 years and under and may be shown in any Western Class and be ridden with two hands.
2. Horses shall be considered one year old on the first day of January following date of foaling.
3. A Green Horse is one that has not been shown prior to December 1, of previous year.
4. A Maiden Horse is one that has not won first place in the division shown prior to January 1st of current year.
5. A Novice Horse is one that has not won (3) first place ribbons in the division shown prior to January 1st of current year.
6. A Limit Horse is one that has not won (6) first place ribbons in the division shown prior to January 1st of current year.
7. A Junior Horse is one that is 5 years or under as of January 1 of the current year. A Senior horse is 6 years or older as of January 1st of the current year.
8. **NO CROSS ENTRY** allowed between Open Registered Light Horse Breed and any other breed division offered at this show, halter or performance
9. Open Registered Light Horse Division: Open to any horse registered with any light horse breed not included in the 2004 prize list. (Morgan, Thoroughbred, Half Arab etc.)
10. Horses that are double registered, i.e. Paint/Pinto etc. must show in one halter division only. No cross entry.
11. Costume Classes: A 3x5 card with information for costume must be submitted to the horse show office, written legibly, describing what the costume represents. No award without description for the announcer.
12. To retain the newly created classes requested, at least 5 entries must participate during the scheduled show.
